
Join us for CPR and First Aid at St. David's!

Storm water Protection and the Environment

Terrell Hills is involved in reducing pollutants that enter into our area streams. All of the water that runs off our streets is not captured and treated. It goes directly into either the San Antonio River or Salado Creek. Everything we do as a community has a direct impact on the quality of water that travels in these streams. We can all help to improve our environment by taking a few precautions.

First, we can reduce pollutants by only using fertilizers, herbicides and insecticides on our lawns when absolutely necessary. Always follow the manufacturer's label to determine the proper amount and when we should use them. Try to make sure when we apply these items that it is on the lawn and not our sidewalks, or driveways. Using natural or organic methods can significantly reduce the pollution and help our area streams.

Secondly, we can all take steps to prevent our soil, leaves, or grass clippings from washing away. These items increase the amount of organics suspended in the water and can increase the PH as well as a dangerous increase in oxygen. This can increase the likelihood of killing fish and other aquatic life. Never sweep or blow leaves and clippings into the street. It is hazardous for our area streams as well as a violation of City Ordinances.

Finally, properly dispose of any oil, lubricants, or fuel for our vehicles and lawn equipment. Any of these items that are spilled or leaked onto hard surfaces washes away and ends up in our waterways. Properly maintaining our vehicles can prevent leaks and reduce overall pollution.

So, the next time you are enjoying our area streams, whether you are tubing down the river or fishing in Port A, remember all of our efforts to help keep these streams and waterways clean for us and for the future.
